I am so grateful to our team for their commitment and enthusiasm in making sure that our students from Year 4 upwards have the opportunity to travel and engage in camps, creating for many, memories which they will hold dear for a very long time.

# Maths in and Beyond the Classroom

In Mrs Hood's Middle and Senior Math classes, students have been working hard to develop core skills, knowledge, understanding and fluency.

Over the past few weeks, the year 7/8 class have been learning how to collect data from primary and secondary sources and interpret the data. Students looked at AFL football scores for 2017 and used this data to create stem and leaf plots, both handwritten and using Microsoft Excel. Students were able to analyse the data and devise five questions they could answer based on the data. For example, 'what was the highest score for Fremantle in 2017?' Students have now extended this topic further and are beginning to look at probabilities, using money as a stimulus. Using the money allows students to develop real-world skills, and utilise concrete materials to make learning meaningful.



The year 8/9 students have too been working on statistics, data and probabilities. Similarly to the 7/8 class, students looked at AFL data, however, the year 8/9's looked at player height, weight and data of birth. Students then used this data to create stem and leaf plots, frequency tables and frequency histograms. Students are extending their knowledge and skills to be able to interpret data and communicate these ideas.



Stage 1 (Year 11) students have been learning about rates and ratios. Students have learned how to write problems as ratios, convert them to fractions and use ratios to divide quantities. Students have also learned about scaled diagrams and how ratios are used for a scale.

Already this semester, Stage 2 (Year 12) students have focused on 'measurement', 'scales, plans and models' and 'geometry'. Students are now learning about investments and loans. They have been able to apply this knowledge to real world scenarios such as buying a car. Students have been researching

different banks and their offers on savings accounts, term deposits and personal loans to calculate the best way to purchase a car of their choice.

Over the past 6 weeks, the Year 8/9 class were fortunate to be involved in the Cows Create Careers (CCC) Farm Module. Clem and Lea Mason kindly lent us two dairy calves to rear over a three week period. During this time, the students were put on a feeding roster and were responsible for tracking their growth rate

and health status. Students were required to submit two assessment pieces to the CCC Judges for participating in the program. They were given four options to submit their assessment pieces on, the requirement was that they complete it all by the end of the module. Pieces submitted included a 3D Research Model, E-mail, Scientific Report and a short 90 second Commercial.

All students had a great time participating and we give special thanks to Clem and Lea Mason for allowing us to borrow their calves and to our Industry Advocate, Steph McFarlane for coming to talk with us about pathways in the Dairy Industry.

On the 28 June, these students will be participating in the Cows Create Careers Dairy Day in Murray Bridge as the final part in their farm module.


### **HEAD LICE IN THE JUNIOR SCHOOL**

# CHANGES TO MEDICATION MANAGEMENT IN SCHOOLS

#### Department for Education (DFE) Safe Practices Regarding Supervision of Student Medications

DFE details safe practices to be followed by all schools in the supervision of all student medications; this includes both prescription medications and non-prescription medications, such as analgesics (eg Panadol, Panamax etc). This is important in preventing any medication errors, discrepancies or deterring other students accessing medications.

#### **Medication Authority or Care Plan**

DFE requires that any student taking medication or bringing any type of medication to school must have medication authority and must hand in ALL medications to the Front Office to be stored appropriately. DFE also requires students to notify staff each time they take any medication so staff can observe and monitor what, how much, and when, medication is taken by a student. This information is then recorded in the medication log. The only exception to this is asthma reliever medication or anaphylaxis medication where immediate access may be required by students. These students must have a current Health Care Plan held at the school and staff members notified as to whether this medication be held in the Front Office or in the students' school bag.

#### All Medications Must be Handed Up to the Front Office

Parents and caregivers are asked to support the school in this matter and not allow your children to carry medication of any type in their school bags (unless otherwise stated in the students' Health Care Plan) and please hand up all medications to the Front Office. A Medication Authority Plan is available from the Front Office should a student require medication on a regular basis. In this way both the school and parents know what, when, and how often medication is being taken and stops students self-medicating or offering medication to other students to self-medicate without parental knowledge.

#### **Analgesics**

Please note that DFE schools are not allowed to hold any sort of analgesics, such as Panadol, in their first aid kits anymore.

#### **Development of Site Response to Student Health Care Plans**

When a new student enrols and has an existing medical condition or allergy, which requires a Care Plan, a Care Plan meeting will be arranged with the parent/caregiver to develop a site response for the medical condition. An annual update of each Health Care Plan will be sought and a meeting to review the existing plan arranged. The site response to the Care Plan will be agreed with the parent/caregiver and will cover the following:

- Health Care Plan to be provided by the student's medical practitioner
- Location and access of medication
- Actions required and critical timeframe
- Variations to the on-site processes and procedures when circumstances dictate. These include events such as sports days, visits to school wetlands and farm, where there is an identified increased risk to the student
- Off-site excursions and camps (in line with DFE Camps and Excursions Policy)

#### **Dissemination of Details of Students with Health Care Plans**

- All teachers will be given a copy of the latest Students with Medical Conditions document. This will be updated as required during the course of the school year
- The individual sheets of the document will be displayed in the staffroom and photocopier room along with a photograph of the child
- All new staff and TRTs will be made aware of the document and the processes and procedures for managing identified student conditions as part of their induction process
- A copy of the Medical Conditions document will be held in each TRT folder
- Update on Students with Medical Conditions will be placed on the Staff and Section Meeting Agenda as a
  permanent item so that changes to students' conditions and new student details can be updated as and
  when required
