Principal's Report

Last week was an interesting time. Things developed rapidly from 12.00 noon on Wednesday and information was changing every few hours. Thankfully we didn't need to go to the extent of the lockdown that we were first advised of, with a very strong possibility of learning from home for all students this week and next.

I would like to thank all of the staff who worked quickly to put things in place to prepare students for learning from home should it have come to that. I would also like to acknowledge the hard work of Catherine Burnett and Emma Swan who were very efficient in getting notices out to all students only to have to have to take them back and replace them with the updated version in the last few minutes of the school day.

A huge thank you to Mrs. Wright, Mr. Bubner, Ms. Giles and Mr. Wauchope who volunteered to supervise the students who needed to come to school on Thursday and Friday. Thanks also to Mrs. Chandler and Mrs. Swan for keeping the front office open. Thank you to all of the other members of staff who followed the minister's request to stay home.

I appreciate the lengths that parents took to find alternative arrangements for their children on Thursday and Friday so that we were able to fulfil the government's aim of having the minimum number of people, both staff and students, congregated at school while the team from SA Health went about their business of tracking all possible contacts of those linked to this outbreak of the coronavirus.

Hopefully this will be the last interruption to the school year that the virus will cause, but there are still restrictions in place and as a result some activities planned for the next few weeks may have to be cancelled or altered.

The Student Free Day that was planned for this coming Friday has been cancelled. School will run as normal on that day.

There are some camps and excursions that have been planned for the next few weeks and these will need to be approved by the Department for Education's COVID 19 team before they can be confirmed.



We had originally planned to have a Swimming Carnival on the last Monday of the year but the Coonalpyn pool is being repaired and will not be ready in time to honour the booking that we had made. The latest round of restrictions would have prohibited this anyway. There will be a Splash Day on that Monday in our pool and we will have some time available for older students to have time in the pool as well. The Swimming Carnival will need to be held early next year

as it has in the past, COVID allowing, but we will recommend to next year's leaders that they consider having another carnival at the end of the year in readiness for 2022.

The Presentation Night will still run at this stage but the more stringent spacing requirements in place at the moment may limit the audience size, and as a result there may be some changes to the way we run it. The committee organising this will be looking at arrangements over the next few days and will communicate these as soon as possible.



While the lockdown has been lifted, students who are sick should still be kept at home until their symptoms have cleared. If the symptoms include those related to the virus, sore throat, runny nose, coughs, and fever among them, please arrange for a COVID test to rule out the possibility. Even if the test is negative, students should not return to school until their symptoms have cleared.

We are still required to minimise the number of adults entering the site. As a result, we ask that parents who walk their children to school leave them at the gate and let them walk the rest of the way to class by themselves. We will have some senior students and SSO's at the front gate who can escort students to their rooms if necessary. We are also reviewing the number of visits that other people make to the school and are prioritising those who are working directly with students to support their learning. Other visits are being postponed or cancelled.



This will mean that the library will be closed during school times until further notice, but we will open it, if restrictions allow, in the week immediately following the end of the school term. This will mean that it will be open on the 12th of December from 10.00am until 1.00pm and holiday hours from the 14th to the 19th December. It will then be closed for normal Christmas holidays, opening again on the 11th January, restrictions allowing.

Ngarrindjeri Cultural Instructor and Boomerang Thrower, Michael Lindsay, demonstrated Boomerang Throwing techniques and taught the students how to throw the Boomerang. Vortex throwing was also incorporated into the sessions.

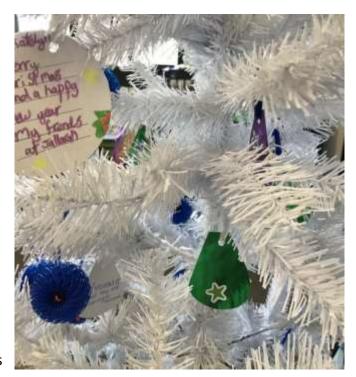
today to be part of the photograph, but I will be sending a photograph to them on our class communication tree.

They have shared their lives, their memories and their dreams.

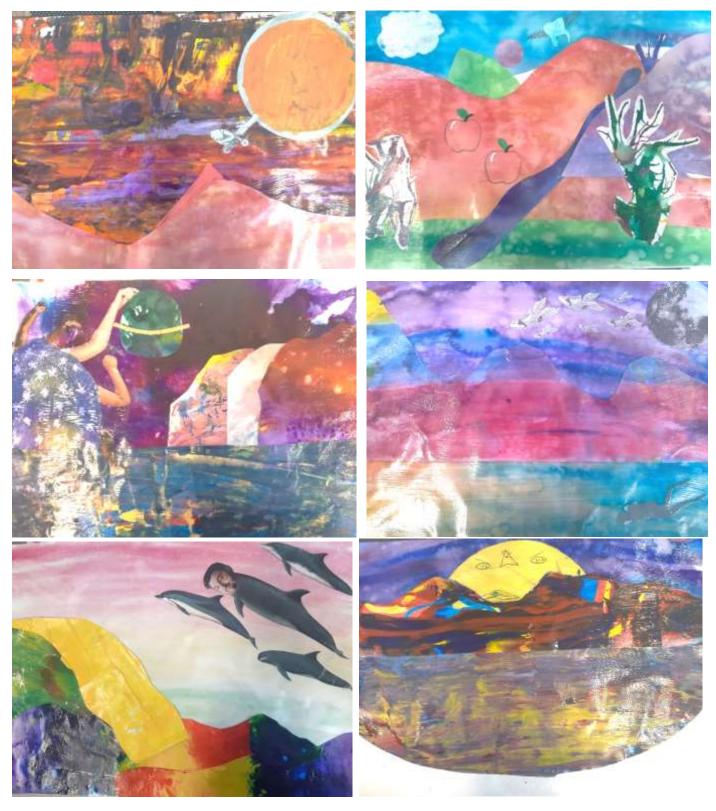
Our tree has 4 different decorations:-

- A two-sided circle from each student that has a photo of each student on one side and a Christmas greeting and the student's name on the other.
- A tear drop shape for each resident with their name on one side with a fact that the student has learnt about them from our communications, and on the other side a special star on the shiny side.
- Blue baubles made from blue plastic legs covers from our new classroom tables. We saved these plastic tubes to recycle them. The students have made many baubles with shiny beads glued into the centre to create a round Christmas decoration.
- A big blue star using recycled wire coat hangers and blue chair leg covers.

Recently, the year 7-8 class have been learning about the Surrealist Art movement in Art. We learnt about the concepts and motivations for Surrealism and viewed and discussed artworks by Salvador Dali. Students then engaged in a variety of Surrealist Art games such as 'Eclabossure' and 'Grattage'. Many of these games involve chance and were often used as a starting point by the Surrealist Artists to then refine and make a complete artwork. Using their results from experimenting with the Surrealist games, students are now composing 'Dreamscapes' that use some of the Surrealist techniques such as juxtaposition, dislocation, metamorphosis and transformation. They have used the mediums of painting, drawing and collage to make a fantastic array of beautiful artworks.
